# St. Joseph's Church

After months of hard work from the first excavation to the final touch up on the paint the restoration of St. Joseph's is now complete. Since our article in the fall issue of the newsletter we have enjoyed the pleasure of seeing the historic church come to life again and return to the glory of its construction period.

As is the case in a project of this nature the job of rebuilding and retrofitting services in a building in rough condition often seems endless. Everything that is done must be custom made to match the existing surfaces from siding to moulding. It is usually more work than building a new structure but persistence has resulted in an accurate high quality restoration. With the completion of the exterior work our concentration during the past months has been on the inside finish. The peeling paint on the walls was scraped, sanded and cleaned to prepare for a new paint job. Samples of the color were taken from the building and matched with specially mixed paint that matches the first color scheme in the building. The blue, grey and white combination is a tasteful attention to the display of the walls and trim. The new heating system and insulation are installed; we had the temperature lowered to 35 below just to see how it worked.

The new lighting illuminating the exterior has made the church the "talk of the town" in Kamloops. We have received many telephone calls and visitors showing the appreciation for the revitalization of this Kamloops landmark and the beauty it adds to the nighttime skyline.

To provide functional interior lighting, turn of the century reproduction gas light fixtures have been installed. The electrified lighting is in keeping with the reconstruction period. Several elders visiting the church have told us stories of the old carbide gas light system used in the church (we found evidence in the ceiling of the system

in the ceiling in some abandoned piping).

We have repaired and refinished the hardwood floor and while it shows the weathering of the year: the richness of the wood compliment: the charm of the rest of the church. The womens church group has raised money to help pay for an aisle runner to protect the floor. They are also busy preparing the altar triclin and linen and cleaning the religious artifacts for the inaugural midnight mass service.

The pews and furnishings from the Residential School Chapel have been moved to St. Joseph's. The excitement of moving the furniture into the new house has prompted many visitors to stop in and see the project. With the return of the artifacts and ornaments to the historic church the chapel at the Residential School is now closed.

This project has been a success because of the support and assistance of many people. We wish to thank the Chief and Council for their support and guidance throughout the job, the administration and the men in the maintenance security and water works departments, and the many band members who offered encouragement and worked on the many aspects of the job.

Throughout the year we have had many people assist in the project but the majority of the work has been completed by a core restoration crew. Special recognition must be given to the people who worked so hard to make this dream a reality: Byron Manuel, Mary Gottfriedson, Ed Jensen, Muriel Thomas, Cindy Seymour, Ron Thomas, Vivian Jules Glen Gottfriedson, Roxy Seymour. This accomplishment is a testament to the capabilities and resources found in the Kamloops Band.

The historic St. Joseph's Church is slated to be one main attraction in the Kamloops district during the Expo year. The grand opening Christmas Eve will see Bishop Sabatini provide midnight mass and ceremony dedicating the restoration project. We hope everyone will come out and celebrate the completion of the rebuilding.

## S. A. Report

Those of you who are in receipt of Social Assistance or on Handicapped Allowance will notice on your January payment a slight increase. Single individuals received \$20.00 bonus and family units received a \$50.00 bonus. The January Social Assistance, handicapped and G.F.A. payments were issued the 20th of December. The next Social Assistance payments will be available in the bank accounts on January 31st for February.

Starting in January those individuals in receipt of Social Assistance, handicapped allowance and G.F.A. will not receive a payment until your renewal slips are returned. The majority of those in receipt of services return their renewal slips, there are a few individuals who do not return these slips.

Regarding the annual review the Social Assistance Manual clearly states that, "An application form must be completed at least once every twelve months by a person in receipt of social assistance on a continuing basis." Section 3.1(c); Social Assistance Manual. It further states that a new application form must be completed upon reapplication for assistance; if a significant change has occurred in a clients situation, Section 3.1(c)11.

## Range Report

Well it looks as if we're going to have a white Christmas this year.

We are now busy with our annual Winter Works Program. To start this program I had to borrow \$10,000.00 from the Band, and with \$5,000.00 from the Department of Indian Affairs we had enough for the program to last until the 20th of December.

What I would like to inform the Band Members is that this is a part of a whole program called "Range Improvement IV" that carries on after the holidays until March 31st of next year. This program will have 5 men and 5 women doing the various jobs such as building cattle guards, water troughs, cutting the lower branches of pine trees, range burning of sagebrush, constructing pasture fences using tractor and post pounder, attending workshops on the care and maintenance of tractor and post pounder, proper methods of using propane tanks, safe and easy methods of operating a power saw and maintenance, first aid course and carpentry lessons, while building the cattle guards and water troughs.

The reasons for all the workshops is very important to the Canada Employment and Immigration (C.E.I.C.) Board. There is so many applicants for the Federal/Provincial Grants now open to the public that they are being very specific on the ones they approve. They must have a training program in any application to the C.E.I.C., D.I.A., C.D.A/B.C. Forestry programs.

We have a spacing and thinning that was recommended by the District Advisory Board that is now in Ottawa waiting to be approved or disapproved. I will notify the Band members when I receive word from Ottawa.

I have scheduled three meetings for January of 1986 that are very

important. The first is on January 15th on the irrigation development east of the school and the upgrading the present Arda system by Dorothy Lampreau's, extension of the system to include Charlie Wah by the C.N.R. Junction and the land at base of mountain above the school going toward Harper Ranch. In order to fill out the application to Special Arda, N.E.D.P., I.E.D.F. or the L.E.A.D. Program we must have all the information we can gather from the individual land owners, the number of irrigation pipes required to irrigate the land properly, what they plan to grow on their property, for how long. Do they need their land cleared and do you need assistance with Special Arda or I.E.D.F. applications? These are just a few of the things we would like to know, before we would be able to apply for assistance in developing the irrigation system. So if you are involved in any of the above please attend.

The second meeting is on January 22nd, this involves the 4-H leaders and parents of children involved in forming the Kamloops Indian Band 4-H club. I believe that by having your youngster involved in 4-H activities at an early age he or she may develop into an outstanding leader of our people in the not too distant future. Please attend this meeting if you are involved already or would like to be involved. We will be planning field trips, camping, picnics for the year. We will also be involved in raising money for the 4-H by sponsoring flea markets, bottle drives, bake sales, etc.

The third meeting is scheduled for January 28th, this is the Paul Creek Stockholders Association meeting this is a very important meeting. Since I've been hired as Range Manager I have tried to be democratic in handling all affairs on the

range. But I still see no advance in getting the people to work together, I still have the same problems, people aren't putting out their share of salt, missing calves stock holders not doing their own riding, etc. The reason for forming the Stockholders Association was to have the stockholders have a more active part in raising their own livestock, while working together. I am going to be bringing the rules and regulations up again with some changes, if these changes aren't agreed to at this meeting I will bring the changes to the Chief and Council. I think it's about time the Stockholders Association with the Directors setting more stringent rules and regulations that the Stockholders will have to follow throughout the year, if not, the stockholders will be fined for not following the rules and regulations that they have set themselves.

Before I sign off, I would like to inform the Band members the importance of good close family relationships. Since our brother J.P. passed away last week we've found that we the family can all sit down together and talk of all the activities that the family has done together and laugh at the good times. So now when I think of "Johnna" it's with a smile, a sad smile but I'm happy just remembering the good times we've had together. I would like to wish everyone a Merry X-mas and a Happy New Year.

# Band Planner

The Kamloops Band has established a 25 lot subdivision near the North Thompson River. This subdivision of 2 acre parcels is located west across the C.N. spurline and runs north to Phyllis Jensen's house and south past George Campbell's barn. A map of this subdivision can be viewed at the Band Office.

The Band has been approached by the Department of Highways regarding the expansion of the highway north of the C.N. Junction to Rayleigh. Also, the Band is negotiating the construction of a new access route to the Industrial park at Cree Road.

The largest development now in the planning stage is the development of the lands and buildings at the Residential School. Rand Iredale is being used to present this development to the Band members at a meeting in early 1985. The site covers approximately 80 acres and will involve a heritage village site.

At a Band meeting on November 13, 1985, the Band members voted in favor of the Kamloops Band to assume authority under Sections 53 and 60 of the Indian Act. These sections are

**Section 53 (1)** The Minister or a person appointed by him for the purpose may manage, sell, lease or otherwise dispose of surrendered lands in accordance with this Act and the terms of surrender.

**Section 60 (1)** The Governor in Council may at the request of a Band grant to the Band the right to exercise such control and management over lands in the reserve occupied by the Band as the Governor in Council considers desirable.

The Kamloops Band is moving faster towards the administration of our own programs, especially in the administration of land. The Band is now in a position to govern all aspects of commercial leases on surrendered lands this includes the power to tax these businesses.

If you desire more information on Sections 53 and 60, an information letter is available for you at the Band Office.

One of our future plans is to have an information booklet regarding the daycare centre and this will be available to any interested persons.

Now for other lives and times at the daycare, we have been sponsoring flea markets and hope to continue to do so in the new year. We also hope to have some other fund raising ideas in the future and all proceeds will go towards new equipment for the daycare centre.

At this time the staff members would like you all to know besides taking care of the little people, we do have other little friends at the centre who are "five fish" and "four geribals". The fish are doing just great, but the geribals are not doing so good. Rosie of course wants to make people aware of her geribals and their conditions, one has recently seen a vet and has an ear infection which could possibly be a tumor, we hope this is not the case, we do have antibiotics to give him or her. Also, one of our two newly arrived geribals is possibly pregnant and she wants to know if anyone would like to adopt one or two?

Rosie says it's great to work here and we do all agree with her.

## Housing Report

By: Mark Phillips

The wood electric furnaces that you have in your house are primarily wood burning units. The electric system of the furnace is to be used as a back-up source of heat only. The furnace was not made to use electricity for any considerable length of time.

Prolonged use of the electrical system will shorten the life of the furnace, plus the fact that electric bills will be abnormally high.

To restore the use of the furnace as a wood-burning unit, the Social Housing Program and the S.A. Program will only allow payments of electric bills up to \$90.00/month. Any bill over this amount is to be paid by the homeowner.

In order to keep your electric bill as low as possible, you can do the following;

- a) use wood as much as possible;
- b) turn down electric thermostat to 66 F at night;
- c) turn down electric thermostat to 60 F during the day if the house is empty
- d) ensure that all windows and doors are closed tight.

To prolong the life of your furnace and to keep the hydro bills down, it is necessary to follow those steps

noted above.

Also, regarding the care and maintenance of your house, Council passed a motion on Monday, February 4, 1985, which reads;

"Be it moved that all repairs and/or maintenance costs be assumed by the houseowner for damages to the house that exceed normal wear and tear, and that each house be inspected by the Housing Committee and Social Housing Administrator every 6 months to assess the care and maintenance of each house."

The concern here is that each house is to be maintained properly so that any normal wear and tear will be repaired under the terms and financial limits of the C.M.H.C. program.

Any damage that goes beyond normal wear and tear will be repaired by the houseowner at their own cost.

Until these houses are paid for, they are Band houses, and, therefore, it is our responsibility to ensure that they are well maintained. These inspections will take place at the same time we are checking for structural faults, etc., caused by negligence of the builder.

At present, we are continuing with repairs to the houses. If you have anything you still need done, please phone me, Thank you.

## HOUSING

We are just about done with all of the ten new homes for this year which brings a total of 34 new C.M.H.C. homes in the past three years. We have completed the repairs for five homes under the

R.R.A.P. Program and have received funding to do two more homes.

Our housing committee would like to let the K.I.B. members know that we only have a very limited budget which we negotiate annually with D.I.A. We do the best that we possibly can with the small budget that we are given to work with.

- #4 Team Sports: \$500.00/year to each team in local leagues  
 team has to consist of 10 Band Members actively participating  
 Coaches that receive coaching certificates for level 1, 2, 3 & 4  
 will be eligible for \$250.00/year toward their team budget  
 Clinics, coaching, umpire, referee, etc. will be paid by the  
 recreation department 100%. This will provide the youth with  
 organized practice and training methods, required to achieve high  
 levels skills and positive attitudes.
- #5 Bingo: With licence acceptance, recreation department will hold a bingo every  
 2 months. Money raised will go toward building and repairing  
 recreational facilities and assistance for activities for Band  
 Members. The first bingo budget is set at \$5,000.00.
