

Matters such as the continual efforts of Chief Manny Jules for changes to the Indian Act pertaining to surrendered lands, as well as taxation authorities on Reserve lands, the home improvement programme to up-grade housing by the application of vinyl siding etc., completion of the restoration project on St. Joseph 's Church, final approval by Order-in-Council 1986-2457 No. dated October 30, 1986 giving the Band Land Management Authorities under Sections 52 and 60(1) of the Indian Act. obtaining Balco Forest Products Ltd. as a major Lessee in the Industrial Park, as well as the Husky Oil site, the setting up of Land Management and Membership Committees, the commencement of the proposed development of the Residential School properties into a major Administrative. ELECTORAL OFFICER REPORT

Re: Kamloops Indian Band General Election - December 10, 1986

The General Election of the Kamloops Indian Band was conducted in accordance with the Kamloops Indian Band Election Regulations dated 1981 with amendments dated 1985.

The results of the election are as follows:

NOMINATION MEETING

The notices for nomination were posted in accordance with the Band Regulations. Judge Houghton replied to the Bands request advising that he would act a "A Friend of the Band" to hear any appeals arising from the Election and this message was announced to those present at the nomination meeting.

Appendix "A" attached is a list of those persons nominated for the positions of Chief and Council and also indicates thost that declined nomination.

ADVANCE POLL

A total of thirteen electors cast their ballots during the advance poll held on December 3, 1986 from 0900 hours to 2000 hours each elector at the advance poll signed a declaration stating that they would not be on the Reserve during polling day.

POLL

The general election was held on the 10th day of December 1986 at the Kamloops Indian Band Conference Centre and the poll was open between the hours of 0800 and 2000 hours. The results of the Election are attached (Appendix "B")

SOCIAL WORKER REPORT

In the last few months I have been in contact with the three Ministry of Social Services and Housing (formerly the Ministry of Human Resources) offices in the City of Kamloops. The purpose of our contact is to coordinate client transfers off and on Reserve and also primarily to prevent over payments. What is now happening any Band member or resident of the Kamloops Reserve who make application for Social Assistance at any of the M.S.S. offices Kamloops, the Income Assistance worker now contacts me, inquiring whether or applicant is presently the not receipt of social assistance from our office. This procedure is working quite well.

After an application for assistance is made at the office here, I contact the M.S.S. and ask them to do a province wide inquiry through their computer system whether or not the applicant is in receipt of assistance anywhere through the province.

I helped coordinate the last Social Development Workers meeting which was held last month. This meeting was the most successful meeting I have attended.

Ideas and concerns regarding the delivery of Social Assistance was discussed with many excellent suggestions provided.

There has been a change with regard to earning exemptions. Effective immediately a single applicant or a family applicant are given an earning exemption of 50.00 for a single unit. 100.00 for a family unit plus 25% of earning in the month. This means for example a single person on assistance works and earns 150.00. He is entitled to the 50.00 earnings exemption plus a further exemption of 25% of 150.00 which equals 37.50 this totals to 87.50 which is subtracted off the 150.00 equalling 62.50 which is deducted off his social assistance. This same rule applies to family units, except the basic earning exemption is 100.00 plus 25% of the total monthly earnings. For example a and wife finds part time employment. They are entitled to the 100.00 earning exemption and if they earned 300.00 then they get another exemption of 25% of the 300.00 which totals to 75.00 is added to the 100.00 this total earning exemption of 175.00 from the 300.00 leaving 125.00 which is deducted off their social assistance.

Also a reminder to those of you on social assistance, that I will not be making a bank deposit into your account nor have a cheque made up until I receive your monthly renewal slip. This must be completed fully on the back of the slip and signed and dated. These are to be completed and returned by the 20th of the month.

C.H.R. REPORT

Well with Christmas just around the corner and the New Year coming closer, new and old events will be happening. The Kamloops area will be getting a nurse in the new year. As of this date all the babies are up to date on their immunizations. There are a few that will need their next shot in January.

It is important for infants to keep up with immunization, the most important one being (MMR) rubella (or german measels), measels and mumps. This shot is given after they are 12 months old. This shot is important because there was measels going around about a month ago and the germs may still be in the area.

Also if infants are up to date with immunization it may help fight off other common colds and flu that may be in the area.

If your child or yourself get a cold that lasts more than 2 or 3 days and not improving under medication, you should seek medical attention as soon as possible. As this is how the flu starts and can lead to an infection in the chest or lungs that may lead to phenumonia. You may need antibiotics.

There were 17 people who received flu shots this year, the elderly, chronic ill and anyone with bad chest conditions.

People under the age of 35 can get the flu shot at the your local doctor or at the health unit. If you are more prone to catching the flu or common cold it is suggested you receive this shot. Also children with heart or chest conditions should get the flu shot. The cost for the shot is \$10.00.

The new nurse will be giving the flu shot in January at no cost to the following people; heart or chest conditions and chronically ill persons.

A hint to prevent colds and sore throats, the keep the temperature of your homes at about 60 degrees. Not too hot or too cool. So that you are not sweating when you go outside.

Also don't coop yourself and children in the house all week, it is good to get some fresh air, as it is a shock to the body if you don't have a change of temperature. When you go outside, dress yourself and children for the weather, warm clothing, boots, etc.

For anyone interested in taking standard first aid course, please contact me as I am planning a course in the new year.

For those people turning 19 years old in the new year, don't forget to sign up for your own BC medical plan, as you are cut off your parent's card when you turn 19. Please come in a couple of months before your birthday to sign up and be sure to bring your social insurance number and status card number with you.

Understanding Communicable Diseases

Chickenpox

How spread; secretions from nose, throat and mouth of infected people.

Identification; sudden onset with slight fever. Blister-like rash occurs in successive crops. Scabs form after blister stage. "Spots" usually appear first on the body, face and scalp, then later spread to the limbs.

Incubation; usually 14 - 21 days (from
date of contact)

Communicable Period; 5 days before spots appear, 6 days after the last crop of skin blisters.

Control; keep home until 6 days after the last crop of skin blisters appear. Suggested Treatment; cut fingernails short to prevent from scratching, calamine lotion, baking soda paste or oatmeal bath to relieve itching. Prevention: none.

Pinkeye

How spread; secretions from nose, eyes, throat of infected people. Contaminated fingers, clothing, etc.

Identification; white of eye looks pink. Watery discharge becomes thick and yellow. Eyes itchy and sensitive to light. Incubation; about 1 to 3 days (from date of contact).

Communicable period; untreated 14 to 21 days.

Control; keep home 2 to 3 days, if being treated, or as advisd by doctor - usually while redness and discharge last. Suggested treatment; see doctor for treatment. Wash hands often. Separte towels and toilet articles for all family members. Avoid rubbing eyes. Prevention; good personal hygiene. Keep hands away from eyes. Frequest hand washing.

Ringworm

How spread; direct and indirect contact with skin lesions of infected people, cats, dogs, contaminated floors, shower stalls, etc.

Identification; flat, spreading ring shaped lesion usually red and scaly or dry and crusted scalp infection patches of temporary baldness at sites of lesions.

Incubation; usually 4 to 10 days (from date of contact).

Communicable period; as long as untreated.

Control; keep home until treated.

Suggested treatment; call doctor, thorough bathing. Treat infected animals. Tinactin or Whitfield's ointment for skin lesions.

Prevention; good personal hygiene.

Lice

How spread; direct contact with infested people and articles, e.g. hats, bedding, combs.

Identification; small white eggs (nits)

firmly attached to hair shaft, especially around ears and nape of neck. Itchiness. Grayish-white (sometimes brownish) lice 1 - 2 mm long.

Incubation; nits hatch and reach maturity in 8-10 days.

Communicable period; until lice and all nits are destroyed.

Control; keep home until treated.

Suggested treatment; treat entire family at same time. Remedies can be purchased at drug store. Follow directions carefully. Remove nits with fine tooth comb. Wash clothes and bedding in very hot water or dry clean.

Prevention; good personal hygiene.

Scabies

How spread; direct contact with infested people.

Identification; sudden itchiness. Many tiny waxy lines and blisters that crust over - can be seen in skin folds between finges, wrists, elbows and knees. Does not affect face and neck.

Incubation; several days before itching is noticed.

Communicable period; until mites and eggs are destroyed.

Control; keep home until treated.

Suggested treatment; treat entire family at same time. Remedies can be purchased at drug store. Follow directions carefully. Itching may persist for days after treatment. Launder clothing and bedding.

Prevention; good person hygiene.

I have been very busy the whole year trying to find employment for the Band members, but with the continual changes in leaders in the government it is very hard. I have just returned from a meeting with Canada British Columbia Federal Resource Developement Agreement Board. (CDA/BC FRDA Board). I found that the (Manpower) has 13 million set aside for the people who are on UIC. I argued that this program is no good to our Band members because no one has had steady employment for the past year and there would be very few who were eligible for this program. I would be grateful if all the members who would be eligible for UIC during January, February, March and April to drop in and let me know, if I find there is enough for a project I will fill out an application for this project.

Reid, Collins and Associates and Karl Mair, RPF for DIA Central District the former having done the inventory and Mair who will do the forest management plan for the Kamloops Indian Band and hopefully will have completed the forest management plan by the end of January. I plan to submit a Silvicultural Program as soon as we receie the management plan. If the management plan enable us to work 8 months of the year with funding from the FRDA Program. I'm sure we will be able to work the other 4 months by using our resources such as cutting christmas trees. firewood. pruning tres, cutting fence posts, etc.

In closing I would like to mention that the meetings I've listed weren't my only meetings of the year, there are far more to mention. One of the important (most) one is coming, regarding the irrigation system on East Shuswap Road on December 17th, see you there! Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

A Day In My Life

It was after supper. The days work was A game of crib was going on. When the boss Irwin Kerr came into the bunkhouse. The crew were chewing the rag with him. Finally, he told us, "We have to get an early start in the morn-I want a couple of cowboys to ing. bring some saddle horses in tonight. are gonna cut out some steer calves and dry cows. Hold them for a couple of days. Then drive them to the CPR stock So Danny, you and Tex Fosberry saddle up and bring in all the saddle horses. They were by the gravel pit before supper, couldn't have gone far." Tex says "Gee whiz, you always pick on us." Kerr told him, you always wanted to be a cowboy, now is your chance, or you can shovel more manure tomorrow. and Tex were always good pardners. It took us an hour and we got in all the horses, even them we used for haying. Can separate them in the morning. fed them alot of hay.

Joe LaVere was the head cowboy. He woke us up real early to catch our horses and get them ready for the round up. Breakfast is usually at 6:00. So by 6:30 its still dark in November. LaVere said Danny and Tex go up by the springs, this side of Gus McGregor's and drive everything to the lake. We will all meet there by noon if we are lucky. The rest of the boys come with me. We're going to the east boundary fence. We will break up in two's there.

Me and my pardner, started off in a lope, a long ways to go. We started high and if we seen anything we drove them down hill. Getting daylight and foggy, gonna be hard to see the cattle. We split up after deciding where to meet. Sure is hell of a big range and the cattle were pretty well scattered.

Drove about 50 head to a swamp. I went on a high knoll to look around. There was my pardner down there, herding a good bunch. Around the knoll he went again, the fog was lifting. I better see what my pal was up to. He seen me and said "I'm sure I've been here before." So I told him what he was doing, and drove his bunch to join the herd I drove to the swamp.

What darn lake were we supposed to meet the rest. We will drive this bunch to the last lake towards the ranch and come back to that mountain over there. then we should spot someone. When we got to a spot where we could see down the valley. The fog was all gone and starting to get sunny. A coule of cowboys were down the bottom herding a good bunch of cattle. "Let's go down and give them a hand" I told Tex. Not long, we caught up to Tom Dennis and Joe Seymour. "Which lake are we supposed to meet with the stock we've got." The one above the mine said Scotty (Tom Dennis). They are waiting for us there. mackinaw it was nearly noon already. The bunch we've got is not too far. we will leave you and drive ours that We might be a little late. tell Joe to send a couple of guys to help us. We will be over that ridge. Heck this is the life, I like riding. We made it to the lake a little after noon. We were the last to get to the Joe Seymour made a fire on a cat faced tree. We had lunch, got nice and warm, alot of b.s. flying around. head cowboy said for George Laquette to ride point as he knew the way. Dan and Tex ride high on the right wing. couple more on the other wing. The rest will ride the drag. Take them cows and calves easy.

My pardner Tex told me that in March or April he was gonna leave the Harper Ranch. His Dad was an engineer, going with him and his brother to Whitehorse to work in a mine. "Sure gonna miss you pardner, we have worked together for a

couple of years, maybe I will never see you again." I rode along thinking of all the good times we've had together. To me he was like a brother, even if he We are about the same was a whitey. age, 18 years. I was a couple of months older then he was. We drank alot of booze together, also alot of hard days. "Hey, old Dan a couple of cows are heading up the hill, I'll get them, you stay here." My daydreams were true, when he hollered at me. I was watching him run the cows back to the herd. Joe LaVere hollered at Tex, "God dam it, I said to take it easy." We like to give them doggies a good scare when they get out of line.

It was getting dark when we got them cows and calves into the pasture. Hay was spread out for them. We look after our saddle horses. Supper was at 6:00 p.m. We checked our horses again after supper.

I and Tex were yakking away in the bunkhouse, reliving our past experiences, remember we were chasing cows, your horse fell and slid down the gully and broke the cantle on your saddle, and again when we tried to swim across the river at Pritchard when we were half When we darn near drowned in a cut. frog pond at the stud pasture, it was full of weeds. When we had a fight with a couple of wino's in front of Mally's news stand. When our pal Sam Watzke got horned in the eye at the Vernon Stampede, on and on 'til Joe Seymour called us to have some pheasant soup. Boy it was good soup. Used to be hundreds of pheasants roosting in the willows behind the bunkhouse.

Tomorrow we will start cutting out the cattle, wein calves, some for shipping.

---**---

It was two or three weeks after we rounded up the cattle. Irwin Kerr came around to the bunkhouse after supper.

"In the morning, Joe will pick his men to bring the cows with their calves. Gonna cut out the calves and dry cows. So have a good nights rest."

After Irwin left Joe LaVere said "I may as well pick who is gonna cowboy tomorrow. The same men who were on the round up a while back will ride again. So Dan and Tex you can put your manure forks away for a day. Me and my pardner were cleaning out the pens. Gonna have the steers in them, getting them ready for the fat stock show next spring.

In the morning the head cowboy woke us up bright and early to fix our saddle horses, clean the barn, water, feed and and give oats to the horses. Joe told me to take a different horse. Use Old Nigger, he is a good gate horse, after he gets warmed up. I never was a gate Don't know beans what he man before. was talking about. He asks me "Have you ever done that before?" I told him sure, alot of times. I think he knew I was full of b.s. "That's the way to go Peter Bushy" he says.

After breakfast I and Tex were chums again. The two of us were to go along the river, chase everything up to the bench above the springs. From there, the whole works will be driven to the home ranch. Our area was easy to cover, but there was alot of cows and calves. A piece of cake, no problems. Not long we were waiting by the spring. We were the first ones there. Someone was having problems up the side hill. Let's go up there and help him. It was icy and steep, easier to chase them on foot. We got them down anyway. When we got to the appointed place, we started the whole works for home. All the crew were there. We got them all to the corrals about noon.

Took a short break for dinner. Cutting out the calves was the first job. I asked my Uncle Joe Seymour, what should I do when $I^{\rm t}m$ the gate man. He said, a

cowboy will cut out a calf or 2 or 3 from the herd, you will be by the gate, you will let them go into the pen behind So only the calves are to go in I bet Joe LaVere and Kerr done there. it on purpose to bring a cow and 2 calves. One calf went by, now the other cow and calf both tried to follow. reined Old Nigger and my God, he ducked and cut back the cow. I darned near slid off sideways. The cinch wasn't on My saddle horse knew more too tight. about the job then me. All I had to do was hang on and hope for the best. Nigger was warmed up alright. something new again today. Done good with a good horse.

Another time we had to drive a bunch of cattle to Kamloops. To ship from the CNR yards. The same crew, I and Tex Fosberry, George Laquette, Joe Seymour, Sterling Bathgate, Alfred Boney, Tommy Dennis, Shorty Camille, Billy LaRue, Big Sam Watzke and the head cowboy Joe We started off early that LaVere. morning. Kerr said he may as well join The more cowboys the better. us. went okay 'til we hit the red bridge. Kerr and George Laguette were riding One of them had to ride ahead to lead. stop the traffic, cars, trucks, etc. Mark darn sure to stop everything. will give you 15 minutes then we are starting them across.

I am telling you, we had a hard time to get them started. LaVere told us to get into the bunch after about 50 head and try to keep them moving. After the few head started the rest followed. All of them squared toward the center. We pushed them hard, heck no problem at all. Turned left across the bridge, just a block or two and there are the stock yards.

While having lunch, Joe and Sterling said we all kick in 2 bucks a piece for beer and taxi fare. Sure. No more than 2 dozen now, got done eating, here they come in a cab, with beer and a couple of

26'ers of rye. All I had was a couple. I and Tex had to take them horses back to the ranch. The others were half cut and went back on How's Taxi cost \$5.00.

Harper Ranch is a good place to work. I've spent about 4 years there. Violet, Irwin's wife was a nice lady. Their son Raymond was a small little boy about 4 or 5 years old then. Such a small boy he was. A few chinese were there in the summer to irrigate the crops. Ray used to spend alot of time with them in the evenings. Jimmy Stubbs was a chore boy. I don't know why they called him that. because he was as old as the hills. Ken Lindquist was the horse breaker and all around hand. Ken and his wife Ida lived not far from the home ranch. Sterling Bathgate and his wife Shirley lived down along the river. Used to be known as old camp, also Gabay.

I hope someday to visit the ranch, a #1 outfit.

I Remember

I want to write a little about my old pardner George (Laquette) Alexis. When I first knew him he was already known as Old Doctor George. When you are not 20 years old yet, anyone over 35 years was over the hill. Always thought, I would not like to be that old.

Doc got to be a good friend of mine. I don't know why he took a liking to me. But anyway, one of my early jobs off the reservation, I got through him. It was the Harper Ranch. George was the head mower man come haying time. About 3 or 4 sets of teams were steady on that job.

As a cowboy he could do anything. Used to have a bay mare, he was really proud of. Used to be a stampede as it was

called then, July 1st and 2nd in Kamloops. He was entered in the turn stake races. Doing figure 8 in the competition. Not the best but made the rest earn their money. Not bad for a cow pony.

I and him also got a job at the home ranch in Douglas Lake Cattle Co. We fed cattle all winter about 1500 head. That is alot of loads of hay. Used a sleigh and team. No baled hay then, used pitch forks. Morris Roth was the ranch foreman then. Used to help us once in a while. George was pretty well known in that area. We both left in March. Came to Kamloops with the fat stock. The ranch used to have alot of steers entered as singles, spares, groups of 5 and carload. Morris said see you next fall. I hope.

Doc's daughter was married to Raymond Peter's, so it is Peter Peters and Lila's grandpa. I was down the States when my pardner passed away. Got a telegram of his death. Got it too late to attend his funeral. Where he is buried, I do not know.

So be it.

____***

When you are riding with your chum, alot of time is spent talking to one another. On an early ride back to the Harper Ranch Doc was telling me as a young man, him and three or four other people from the Kamloops Reserve were hired by the CNR to freight goods and materials. All done by teams and sleighs or wagons. Mostly they hauled to Wire Cache. Sometimes past that. Some teams and hired wagons were also from local farmers and the Chu Chua Reserve. Worked long hours. 'Til the railroad was done.

Doc George also told me of the stampede at Tranquille. Especially the point to point races (suicide race) that was a

tough one. Alot of cowboys were entered and was mostly won by an Indian from the Reserve. His sayings were, "aye wa ya" or "gol sarn it." Another thing was, I have never seen him mad. Even if he had a hard time to catch his horse, or at a person. Never heard him sing or chant Indian songs. Most people do that when they are half cut or drunk, not him.

Used to wear a cap all the time and a hankerchief around his neck. My pardner was an okay guy. I and Doc worked together alot. So you can't be with him and not learn anything.

Always used to tell me, never stay on the reserve too long. Always try to get a job somewhere else. You work for the Band, you will never get ahead. I would say that he was right. So far I ain't got nothing.

I Did Not Go All The Way T.G.

____***

It was hell to be a wino as a young man. Say from 17 to 20 years of age. Most of the time, I woke up with a hang over. Most of the time you woke up broke. No money at all. But sometimes you woke up with 5 or 10 dollars in your pocket. How the heck did I get this money, when all I had was a couple of bucks, panhandling from some of my chums. Lately even my pals were dodging me. They knew darn well I am going to put the bum on them.

This day, luck was with me. I woke up about 9 or a little later in the morning. Counted the few bucks I had, I don't know how I got into this home, I slept on the couch. Hollered if there was anyone home. Someone answered all way okay, washed my face in a basin, got the water out of a pail. There was no running water. Got slicked up and ready for another day.

Walked around outside. I was on the

Kamloops Village. The year was in the mid forties. Most of the homes were occupied, only a few were empty. This is the reservation I was born and raised in. I will not mention the real names of my friends or bootleggers or the white people I am writing about.

Went to visit my Uncle, him and his wife were gone. So was the team of horses and wagon. Could be they went to make wood up seven mile camp. Went into the house and made a couple of sandwiches, washed down with some cold coffee. Even with a hang over I had a good breakfast. Washed the few dishes I used.

Someone knocked on the door, it was my pals. Come on lets walk to town and shoot some pool. We will all chip in and I will make a few bucks. I put in a couple of bucks, all told our pool shark had 6 bucks, he was a hell of a good player, only one with any brains. We got into town, not before the CNR bull gave us hell for walking across the rail way bridge. Never ever do it again, go across the red bridge, it's only a couple of miles further.

We got in the pool hall, I and a couple of my chums had a game of snooker, while the shark played on the first table and played pea pool at .25 per game. were there an hour when we asked our shark how he was doing. I am breaking even, should make money pretty quick as the good players are going to lunch. While you are playing we told him, we will look for a semah. We have enough for half a gallon of wine, which is \$2.50 and a couple of dollars for his troubles, which he charges to buy us booze. We had a hard time to get someone to send to the liquor store, which was on 1st avenue and Victoria Street. Finally Mr. P. gets off the bus, you are just the guy we are looking for, here is so much for the 1/2 gallon of Vin Supreme and a couple of bucks for your trouble.

He says "I can't go too far to give you the stuff, where is a safe place." I told him down by the baseball field down the park. Leave it by the 3rd base dugout, all okay, I will watch from the tracks (railway). If I see a bull coming I will give a whistle. One guy waits a little ways from the dugout, and another guy will follow Mr. P. sure he don't go south (run away with our booze). Heck everything goes so smooth, no problems. We got our vino and take a chance to go across the steel bridge (CNR) and into the (Kamloops Point). Sit down in the shade and drink, tell stories, not too long we polish off that 1/2 a jug. Let's go back to town and see how our pardner is making out at the pool hall. We meet him coming out of the Pheasant Cafe, next door to the Blue Bird Cafe, where the hell were you buggers he says. made \$21.00, had dinner and rarin' to Let's get a couple of 26 ers of 5 It's still \$8.00 a bottle. told him wine is cheaper and more for your money. Mr. P. is in town, should be uptown now. It's a deal. will work it the same way as before. There is a soldier that wants to sell his permit of a gallon of wine for \$20.00 maybe six 26 ounce bottles will be easier to hide and carry. Mr. P. has only 1/2 a gallon left on his permit or a dozen of beer. Cheaper to get our own Semah and then the solider, of course our other chum says why not get both of Th sharks says the bootlegger... But we cut him off, you are out voted. We get the both permits. Here we go The sharks puts in \$10.00. Keeps the rest in the bank. Now to look for the Semah and Mr. P. No problem to find them, and in no time we were back in the jungle. Drinking and singing and arquing. All my chums were getting high. I said to myself, I have to take it easy, look after my chums.

Not long they were all asleep. An old pal of mine, I shall call George,

walking to town, hollered at him to come down and have a snort. Didn't have to call him again. Had a few drinks, come on I'll buy you supper he says. about my pals that are passed out. will be okay he says. But first I will have to roll my own pals. Took their wallets and their money. Better for me to look after their money then someone else to roll them. Walked to town again and had supper at the Blue Bird. George was gonna go to the show, you comin' he says. Not tonight pardner. I^Lm qonna see how my pals are doing at the point, some other time I tell him.

Back I go again across the black bridge. I'll be darned all my chummies are gone. The jugs are empty. The CNR cop happened to come by and I asked him about my chums. He said the Black Marie came and picked them up and now they are in jail. I took a long walk up to Columbia Street to see what I could do. The cop at the desk said I could see one of them only and just for a minute. Which one did I want to see. The shark is he in here too, yes sir he says. I'll get them. In a couple of minutes in comes the shark. How the hell did you get in here and what are the charges. He says, never mind, just get a couple packs of cigarettes. Gimme the money I says, with my hand out. You will have to ask the cop at the desk. When we came in they took our belts, shoes laces, wallets, etc., etc. The cop said they had no wallets or money. the shark I had all their money and billfolds and will get their cigs. the jailer will give it to them. Court will be at 10:00 in the morning, I'll be there.

So at 10:00 the next day, I was there alright. They all got one day or \$5.00 and 2's cost, after the trial they got their belts, laces, etc., etc. and walked down the street, gave them their belongings, shall we chip in and get a 26'er from the bootlegger. I told them a bottle of Sam Suey costs 2 1/2 or

cheaper yet a bottle of shaving lotion, aqua velva, get out of here.

Maybe someday us natives could go into the beer parlors without getting kicked out. Maybe even be allowed to buy our own jugs from the liquor store, and be a Semah.

It was hard to get a white man to buy the booze for you. Unless you knew him or her really good.

Same with the bootlegger. Seems to me they charged \$8.00 for a 26 er and \$5.00 for a 12 ouncer. A dozen beer was about \$5.00 a case. They also had to know you pretty good.

The fines in the 40's was pretty well \$5.00 fine and 2 1/2 costs.

When booze was rationed during the war. The price was \$15.00 to \$20.00 per gallon of wine. Later on when I smartened up a little, worked on a ranch for \$85.00 per month, room and board, got to know a few Semah.

Pretty near the end of the war, Geneva Gin was not rationed anymore. Everybody was drinking it.

One Chinese New Year a pal of mine took me to china town, Victoria Street West, got introduced to Sam Suey drink, about the size of a beer bottle, price 2 1/2.

One pay day, while shooting a game of pool, Shorty said come into the bathroom and I will give you a drink. It was shaving lotion, it won't flow out, you had to suck hard to get anything out of the bottle. Shoe polish I will not touch. Even after Natives were allowed into bars and pubs, I always used to gobble my drinks, look over my shoulder for cops.

Some of my whitey friends say you can't get so drunk, that you can not remember anything. I know different. At some

parties I don't know how I got home. Who brought me, how? What time?

No wonder I don't get drunk anymore. KNOCK ON WOOD!

Fight with your own friends. Beat up your wife and kids, dressed in rags, black eyes, jail terms. Yes Sir, we had alot of fun. That's what I heard. Bumming around for drinks, pounding off your belongings, messing yourself, pissing around the streets. This is only a few things on top.

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


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
